Refugee Protection Situation Report (No.2/2017)

Period: 2nd February – 28th February

Date: 15th March, 2017

Contextual Analysis

Kenya's order to shut down Dadaab refugee camp is still in force. The Kenyan Government has yet to reverse the orders after the High Court ruled that the closure of the Dadaab refugee camp was <u>unconstitutional</u>. The government has also filed an appeal to challenge this decision by the High Court at the Court of Appeal. Nonetheless, the High Court order still remains for the time being.

Cases of arrests on charges of residing outside a designated area without authorization and unlawful presence increased by 56. In the Refugee Protection Situation Report No.1 of 2017, RCK recorded 23 such cases. Between 2nd of February and 28th of the same month, RCK has recorded 79 such cases. Below is a summarized compilation of the report collected and collated by RCK staff and monitors in the field.

Dadaab


Border crossing from Somali into Kenya has decreased by 21 percent. Between December 22nd 2016 and January 22nd2017, RCK recorded 2,833 Somali and Ethiopian nationals crossing into Kenya. The Ethiopians interviewed were moving primarily because of persecution in their country of origin. The Somalis, on the other hand were moving owing to security concerns. In the period between 22nd January 2017 and February 22nd 2017 there were 2,235 crossings into Kenya made by Ethiopian and Somali nationals. The reasons for movement have not changed from those provided in January.

Movement from Kenya has increased by over 300% between 22nd January, 2017 and 22nd February, 2017. Between 22nd December, 2016 and 22nd January, 2017, RCK recorded 2,185 Somali refugees leaving the camps heading to Somalia. This figure increased to 7,884 as the repatriation efforts by RAS intensified in the reporting period. Graph 1 below shows the figures in last reporting period compared to the current reporting period. It should be noted that there are some Somali refugees spontaneously leaving the camps which would account for the differences between these figures and those provided by UNHCR for Somalis leaving by road.

In the period under review, RCK received 23 cases of new arrivals from Somalia fleeing the drought situation. These Somali nationals arrived in Kenya within the last six months. This figure is expected to rise in view of the crisis in Somalia that has been precipitated by the drought affecting the region.

Garissa

There were no major incidences in Garissa involving PoCs other than what is indicated in the findings section.

Kakuma

There were no major incidences affecting PoCs that have been reported in Kakuma other than those indicated in the summary findings.

Nairobi

There were no major incidences reported in Nairobi. However there is a rising concern of xenophobic attitudes in Kitengela Kajiado County targeted at PoCs residing in the area. Traders in the area have been lamenting of unfair business practices used by the refugee community. They allege that they are required by the county government to pay for business licenses whereas the refugees are not. This makes the goods sold by the refugees cheaper as they do not have license costs to pass on to the final consumer as compared to the Kenyan traders. The matter may take a political angle considering that some aspiring Members of County Assembly (MCA)¹ have reportedly made campaign pledges to relocate the PoCs from that area.

There is also a further grievance from the community that the refugees are operating without work permits. This has prompted the law enforcement officers in the area, to change the nature of charges once they arrest the PoCs. Whereas they were charging them under the Refugees Act, 2006 for residing outside a designated area, a charge that carries a penalty of **6 months** in prison or **Ksh.20,000** fine; they are considering charging them under s.53 of the Kenya Citizenship and Immigration Act, 2011 for working without a work permit. This offence carries a **Ksh.500,000** or a **36 months** jail sentence in lieu of the fine.

Conclusion

Despite the ruling of the High Court in February, declaring the closure of camp as unconstitutional, the government has yet to make any public statement on the future of the camp. Camp consolidation is

still on going as so is the Somali repatriation exercise. Cases of arrest are still being recorded especially against Ethiopian and Somali nationals accessing the country either for asylum or for economic reasons. A new trend that is unique to this reporting period is a rise in xenophobic attitudes among Kenyans against refugees in Kitengela. This might escalate considering that this is an election period in Kenya and already some MCAs are making campaign promises to remove the PoCs from that area.
